Through a set of meetings, the Youth Council will design and launch a campaign to create more awareness on the intersections of islamophobia, xenophobia, and gender inequality, and the subsequent challenges facing Muslim women and migrants, as well as providing alternative and empowering narratives on Muslim women other than victimization and discrimination.

As a member of The Hague Youth Council, you will be able to showcase your talent and advocate for changes of societal behaviour towards gender, the Islam and xenophobia with a group of students that has the same passion. The Hague Youth Council will provide you with the opportunity to become part of a campaign which will influence policy-makers and raise public awareness.
